#### From the Chair:

Please welcome our new members: Clan Macnachtan, Zorra Caledonia Society – Embro Highland Games, Almonte Celtfest, and Guthrie School of Dance.

Those who attended the AGM back in November know that we had an interesting event, which did not turn out as anyone expected.

Your board has had good discussions on what happened and worked out a path forward with the overall strategy for the side-swiped AGM Special Resolution. A quick summary of what happened with this derailment is that there was a misinterpretation of Robert's Rules regarding a motion to table.



Lessons have been learned in that Robert's Rules are replaced by the Canadian Bourinot's Rules of Order, which will be used from now on, along with some other procedural changes for future meetings. Other issues arising from the AGM will be likely be addressed by an email to member delegates over the next few weeks.

To move forward with strategy, your board, with a committee, is working on both bylaw changes and a name change in order for us to transition to being the national Scottish organization with an expanded membership. Our Spring meeting on Tartan Day, April 6th, is the current plan for the vote on this.

Between now and the Spring meeting, we will hold information/discussion sessions for members once the bylaw and name change are settled upon for presentation.


### Road Show 2025 - Banner Plan



In addition to delighting crowds at events throughout the year dancers compete globally making regular trips to Scotland and appearances at highland games and championship series in North America.





#### About

The original 78th Fraser Highlanders was a Highland Regiment, raised in Scotland to fight in Canada during the Seven Years War. The Regiment fought with distinction at a number of battles including under General James Wolfe at both the Siege of Louisbourg and the Battle of the Plains of Abraham. At the conclusion of the war the Regiment was disbanded in Canada and many members of the Regiment settled here and have become an important part of our nation's history.

The 78th Fraser Highlanders were 're-raised' in 1964 as an historical reflection of Canada's past to perform at the Old Fort on Ille Ste. Helene during Expo 67 in Montreal. Following the event, many people 'bought commissions' in the commemorative regiment in order to keep it alive.

Pockets of supporters began to form in both Canada and the US which resulted in a system of Outposts and Garrison. In a social sense, the Frasers are the largest private army in North America. The modern 78th Frasers are an internationally recognized historical society whose primary mission is the preservation of the memory of the original Regiment, their commanders, comrades-in-arms and their adversaries.

The uniforms worn by the Frasers are replica to 1763 with a patch of Black Bear fur on their bonnets in place of a hat badge! Their kilt is also very unique as it has two extra pleats on the apron reminescent of the philebeg or 'big kilt'.



## Zorra Caledonian Society: Embro Highland Games - New Member



### **About Us**

The Zorra Caledonian Society has been host to Ontario's oldest Highland Games since its inception in 1937. The area's Scottish roots run deep, with the first Scots arriving from Sutherland, Scotland, in 1829. Driven from their homes and land during the Highland Clearances, they arrived in the Township of Zorra where they built a new life while endeavouring to retain something of their heritage and tradition.

A tartan was created and commissioned in 2012, to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Zorra Caledonian Society. The shades of green represent the fertile, rolling hills of the Zorra Highlands that surround Embro. The black shows the strength and endurance of the Society on the occasion of its 75th year. The white represents honour and purity in its actions. The red is for the blood sacrificed by preceding generations so their descendants could prosper in a free country, Canada.

Our Mission Statement is this: "The Zorra Caledonian Society is a non-profit community organization formed in 1937 that celebrates and promotes the Scottish heritage of Embro – Zorra"

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MPP Dave Smith and Peterborough Historical Society President Don Willcock helped to greet visitors as they came in the front door.

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

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# The Thistle and the Fleur de Lys - Le Chardon et la fleur de Lys

#### Join us for a presentation given by Ewen Booth as part of the My Morrin event series!

Most historians have heard of the "The Auld Alliance" between France and Scotland dating back to the early 13th century. Others are familiar with the Scottish settlement to the New World after the Seven Years War, and Irish immigration during the potato famine in the mid-19th century. This presentation is groundbreaking in that it identifies new and important points of Scottish immigration to the New World, primarily to what is present-day Quebec.

Nova Scotia claims the home of the first Scottish immigration to Canada, with the arrival of the ship The Hector in 1773. This presentation dispels this myth, based on nine years of research and genealogy. The music of Quebec, the place names and history of many French Canadian families are intertwined with these Scottish immigrants who settled in Quebec, helping forge the province to be what it is today. This presentation offers a different perspective into our history and explains many things simply hidden in time that are only now being uncovered; it is only the tip of the iceberg.



Ewen Booth is a historical researcher who uses genealogy as a tool to explore into areas uncommonly ventured into by others. He, along with his wife Kathleen McKen, has lived in Montmagny since relocating in 2017. Ewen is a former police officer and museum volunteer, with a passion for history. He uses his experience to now unfold history never discovered by others previously. With over 140 active family trees, Ewen's body of work continues to grow. With a goal of putting these stories on paper and developing mini videos for a YouTube audience, Ewen has also developed a Scottish history tour of both Quebec City and the south shore of the St. Lawrence River based out of Montmagny.

Ewen was the recipient of the 2020 Gordon Atkinson Memorial Prize in Highlander Military History by the Quebec Thistle Council and is the owner of "Le Chardon et la Fleur de Lys," a history project that turned into a business which captures all that he does: research, genealogy, history tours, public presentations, YouTube videos and written short stories. In addition, Ewen and Kathleen are restoring their 1767 home while researching previous home owners, many of whom are relatives to Kathleen. Kathleen is a French-Canadian descendant of a Scottish soldier who remained in Quebec after 1763 and is the Quebec Commissioner for the Clan MacKinnon Society. Join us on our journey!


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

## Preserving the past, Promoting the future

As you know, we had set a provisional date of September 20th and 21st 2025 for the inaugural Saltire Gathering, a new Festival of Scotland and have been working towards this for some considerable time. We have received a tremendous amount of support for the initiative as well as good thoughts and advice from individuals and organisations that we consider integral to the success of the festival.

We have always maintained that we will proceed with the festival in 2025 if funding is sufficient to create an event of note; something that is robust and sets the standard for future events. Key to this is to have a festival that is financially sound which means producing an event that not only delivers in terms of creativity and impact but one which does not leave us in a precarious position. We are also clear that there is a benchmark that we will not drop below because in doing so, the festival will likely be so small that it has the capacity to disengage sponsors, funders and supporters which will make it all more challenging to seek funding for future years.

Recently we have been in conversation with a private donor who has, at time of writing, confirmed verbally, sufficient seed funding to allow us to hire a sponsorship sales manager. Whilst there are no guarantees as to how much sponsorship (and additional funding) will be raised, our feeling is that by postponing the festival until the end of **May/beginning June 2026** gives us a longer sales time and every opportunity to create a much stronger and more impactful festival along the lines of what was originally conceived.

This is an exciting and positive move and one we believe will be welcomed by our supporters. By doing so this allows us to:

- Engage with the North American audience much more strongly given the months of May and June are not
  only more financially attractive, but many families are more able to travel at that time of year. Originally,
  we had looked to produce the festival at this time but for several reasons we had no choice but to go with
  September.
- Event Scotland are keen to see more events take place on the shoulder months of the traditional summer holiday period and will welcome the move.
- Stirling 900 anniversary ends in April 2025 and while the perception is that it will not impact The Saltire Gathering, we believe there could be a commercial impact on local sponsorship.

We are excited by this decision and believe that we will produce a memorable first festival that will set the standard for future events.

#### **Political Martyrs**

"I have devoted myself to the cause of The People. It is a good cause—it shall ultimately prevail—it shall finally triumph." These are the words of Scottish lawyer Thomas Muir at his trial in August 1793.

In a series of trials in 1793 and 1794, Muir, fellow Scotsman William Skirving, and three associates were found guilty of sedition (speech or activities that tend toward rebellion against the established order). As punishment, they were all transported to New South Wales, Australia, to carry out their sentences. Penal transportation was the relocation of convicted criminals or undesirables to overseas colonies for a specified period of time. It was generally a one-way trip as the prisoners had to find their own way back home once their sentence was completed. Transportation was generally awarded as a lesser punishment than execution for serious crimes.

Four of the five men were taken aboard the three-deck convict transport ship Surprize in February 1794 where they were held until the ship got underway in May. During the voyage a plot for murder and mutiny involving two of them was reported to the ship's captain who had them confined together in a small cabin without any of the amenities they had paid for or any of their personal effects.

Ordinary convicts accused of being involved were flogged and kept in chains. After five months, Surprize arrived in Sidney in October 1794. The fifth man was imprisoned in London until May and was then transported as the only prisoner aboard the storeship Sovereign which arrived in Sidney about the same time as the Surprize.

Who were these men, now referred to as "Martyrs," who now have a 90-foot-tall monument in Edinburgh that resembles the Washington Monument in Washington D.C.?

The first "Martyr" was Thomas Muir (1765–1799), quoted above, who was the son of a Glasgow food merchant. He graduated from Edinburgh University with a law degree and was admitted to the bar at age

22. He later became a leader in the Society of the Friends of the People, a group promoting parliamentary reform. It was his role in that organization that led to his arrest, conviction, and being sentenced to 14 years'

transportation to Australia. He was subsequently taken aboard the convict transport ship, Surprize.

He and the other four political prisoners were well treated and given a government house when they arrived in Sydney, but that didn't deter young Muir. Two years after his arrival he escaped aboard an American ship which took him to Vancouver B.C. He then went to Mexico City where he was arrested as a possible spy (Spain and Britian were at war) and sent to Havana, Cuba, where he was held in prison awaiting transport to Spain. The ship carrying him was intercepted off the coast of Spain by British warships. In the ensuing battle Muir was hit by a shell fragment which smashed his left cheekbone and caused the loss of his left eye. He was held in a Spanish hospital until the Spanish government freed him of suspicion in 1797. He then travelled to France where he was welcomed as a copatriot by the French Revolutionists. He remained in France until his death in January 1799, following complications from his earlier wounds.

The second "Martyr" was the other Scotsman, William Skirving (1745–1796). A farmer's son, born near Edinburgh; he attended Edinburgh University with the intent of becoming a minister. He ended up as a private tutor and began farming on lands acquired from the estates of both his father and his father-in-law. He was unsuccessful in his bid to become the Chair of Agriculture at Edinburgh University. In 1792 he was active in establishing the Society of Friends of the People and was appointed as general secretary. It was in this capacity that he associated with the other martyrs.

Following his arrest and sentencing to 14 years' transportation, Skirving spent a month in prison in London before being put aboard the Surprize. He was one of the two involved in the alleged mutiny aboard the transport ship. Once ashore in Sydney, he, like the others, received a small house and set to work accumulating about 100 acres of small holdings which he farmed. He wasn't very successful and went into debt. He became homesick, missed his wife and family, and his health declined. He contracted yellow fever and died of dysentery in January 1796. His burial site is unknown.

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The third "Martyr" was Thomas Fyshe Palmer (1747–1802). Born in Ickwell, England, he was educated at Eton College and Queen's College in Cambridge, England. He held several degrees and became an active Unitarian minister and founder of church societies around Dundee, Scotland.

A society called the Friends of Liberty met in a house next door to Palmer. One of the members asked Palmer to edit a proposed flyer, which he did. The government intercepted it at the printers, found it alarming, and arrested Palmer as the author. He was held in prison in Perth for three months, then moved to London where he was put in irons and forced labor for three more months before being moved to the Surprize. Palmer was accompanied on the trip by several associates who were going to Australia as "free settlers." Palmer was the other martyr accused of mutiny on board the ship.

Palmer was sentenced to seven years (terminating in September 1800) in Sydney where, like the others, he was relatively free to do as he pleased. He and one of his colonist friends constructed a small boat which they used to trade with one of the islands off the Australian coast. They outfitted it with supplies for six months and sailed for New Zealand where they were delayed in getting resupplied another for six months. They then went to the island of Tonga where a local war kept them from landing, so they ended up in the Fiji Islands where they struck a reef. After repairs were made, they set out for Macao, a Portuguese colony on the mainland of China. Storms battered them about; they used up all their provisions and ended up in the Spanish-controlled Marianas Islands. As noted above, Spain and Britain were at war. Palmer and his crew were taken as prisoners of war. Palmer came down with dysentery, died on June 2, 1802, and was buried by the seashore. This was two years after his sentence was completed.

But this is not the end of Palmer's story. Two years after his death, an American captain landed on the island, had his body exhumed, and took it to Boston where it was buried in the Trinity Church cemetery in 1810, only to be moved again to the Mount Auburn Cemetery in Cambridge, Massachusetts, after the Great Boston Fire of 1872.

The fourth "Martyr" was Maurice Margarot (1745–1815). He was the son of a wine merchant, raised in London and educated at the University of Geneva in Switzerland. He lived in France during the French Revolution in 1789 and upon his return to England, joined and became the chairman of a reform group. He and fellow martyr Joseph Gerrald were invited to participate in a debate in Edinburgh hosted by the Friends of the People. They both stood out and were arrested and charged with sedition.

At his trial Margarot defended himself with a speech the judge described as being "seditious." He was found guilty, sentenced to 14 years' transportation and sent to the convict ship Surprize. His wife accompanied him to Australia, and he avoided the mutiny allegations enroute but was later accused by Palmer of backing the ship's captain against the other martyrs.

Once in Sydney, he, like the other political prisoners, enjoyed more freedom than other convicts. He and his wife started a small farm, but he continued his

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
complaints about government management and was reported for promoting sedition on several occasions. He died in December 1815 in extreme poverty, under government suspicion as a pro-French radical. Many in Britain also held him in suspicion because of Palmer's accusations. His body was taken back to London and buried in Old St. Pancras Churchyard.

As part of the expansion of the local railway terminal in 1865, part of that churchyard was demolished.

An obelisk memorial now stands in the cemetery that bears the names of those people whose grave markers are no more. Maurice Margarot and his wife Elizabeth's names are on that memorial.

The last of the five "Martyrs" was Joseph Gerrald (1763–1796), born in the West Indies to a wealthy Irish planter, he was raised in London and did well in school but returned to the West Indies after the death of his father to look after the family's holdings. His father had spent the plantation into debt, so Gerrald moved to Philadelphia where he practiced law for several years before returning to Bath, England for health reasons.

In Bath, he began writing eloquent but anonymous letters critical of politics, published several pamphlets,

and joined a couple of radical groups. He drew on the actions and beliefs of the revolutionaries in France and America for many of his ideas. As noted above, he and Margarot were invited to participate in a debate in Edinburgh hosted by the Friends of the People after which they were both arrested.

He was sentenced to 14 years' transportation, imprisoned until the May sailing of the Sovereign, a supply ship bound for Sydney. He was the lone non-crew member aboard. He arrived in Australia in November 1794 and died from tuberculosis in March 1796. He was buried a stone's throw from where the current Sydney Opera House stands.

So, what did these men do to warrant conviction for sedition and banishment from their homeland?

There were two primary positions that they promoted. The first was universal suffrage: the belief that everyone should be able to vote, not just men or property owners. Secondly, they believed that Parliament should meet regularly and represent everyone. As Muir said, "The cause of the people, it is a good cause – it shall ultimately prevail." These were radical ideas at the time of the French and American Revolutions.

#### A MUNRO AMONG THE BLACKFEET

Hugh Munro or Monroe, whose story is told here in extracts from *My Life as an Indian and Rising Wolf*, by the late J. W. Schultz, was born at Three Rivers Settlement, QC, on 9th July, 1798 and died on the Blackfeet Reservation at Browning, Montana, in1896 [sic]. The photograph is from Rising Wolf, see note on last page.

One of the greatest pleasures of my long life on the plains was my intimate friendship with Hugh Monroe, or Rising Wolf, whose tale of his first experiences from the Saskatchewan-Missouri River plains is set forth in Rising Wolf, just as I had it from him before the lodge fires of the long ago.

Even in his old age, Rising Wolf was about the quickest, most active man I ever saw. He was about five feet six in height, fair haired, blue eyed, and his firm square chin and rather prominent nose be-tokened what he was, a man of courage and determination. His father, Hugh Monroe, was a colonel (should be captain) in the British Army, his mother a member of the La Roches, a noble family of French émigrés, bankers of Montreal, and large land owners in that vicinity. Hugh, Jr., was born on the family estate at Three Rivers, and attended the parish school just long enough to learn to read and write. All of his vacations, and many truant days from the class-room, were spent in the great forest surrounding his home. The love of nature, of adventure and wild life was born in him. In 1819, when about fifteen years of age, he persuaded his parents to allow him to enter the service of the Hudson's Bay Company and started westward with a flotilla of their canoes that spring. His fa-ther gave him a fine English smooth-bore, his mother a pair of the famous La Roche duelling pistols and a prayer book. The family priest gave him a rosary and cross, and enjoined him to pray frequently. Travelling all summer, they arrived at Lake Winnipeg in that autumn and wintered there. As soon as the ice went out in the spring the journey was continued, and, one afternoon in July, Monroe beheld Mountain Fort, a new post of the company, built on the south bank of the Saskatchewan River, not far from the foot of the Rockies.

Around about it were encamped thousands of the Blackfeet waiting to trade for the goods the flotilla had brought up, and to obtain on credit ammunition, fukes, traps and tobacco sufficient to last them through the coming season. As yet the company had no Blackfoot interpreter, their speech having first to be translated into Cree, and then into English. Many of the Blackfeet proper, the North Black-feet, spoke good Cree, but the more southern tribes of the confederacy, the Bloods and Piegans, did not understand it. The factor, James Hardesty, no doubt perceiving that Monroe was a youth of more than ordinary intelligence, at once detailed him to live and travel with the Piegans and learn the language, also to see that they returned to Mountain Fort with their furs the succeeding summer. Word had been received that, following the course of Lewis and Clark, American traders were yearly pushing father and father westward and had even reached the mouth of the Yellowstone, about the eastern line of the vast territory claimed by the Blackfeet as their hunting ground. The company feared their competition; Monroe was to do his best to prevent it.

Monroe often referred to that first trip with the Piegans as the happiest time of his life. Journeying by easy states, sometimes skirting the foot of the mountains, and again traversing the broad plains forty or fifty miles to the eastward of them, they came at the season of falling leaves, to the Pile of Rocks River (Sun River, as the

whites named it), and there they remained for three months, passing the reminder of th winter on the Yellow River (the Judith). They had crossed Lewis and Clark's trail, and here again was a vast region which no white man had ever traversed. When spring came, they went still farther south to the Musselshell, down that to its confluence with the Missouri, and, crossing that great river, they wandered westward along the foot of the Little Rockies, and then by the Bear's Paw Mountain to the Marias and its tributaries.

Monroe remained in the service of the Hudson's Bay Company for a number of years, raising a large family of boys and girls. The old man never revisited his home; never saw his parents after the day they parted with him at the Montreal docks. He intended to return to them for a brief visit some time, but kept deferring it, and then came letters two years old saying that they were both dead. Came also a letter from an attorney saying that they had bequeathed him a considerable property, that he must go to Montreal and sign certain papers in order to take possession of it. At the time, the factor of Mountain Fort was going to England on leave; to him, in his simple trustfulness, Monroe gave a power of attorney in the matter. The factor never returned, and by virtue of the papers he had signed, the frontiersman lost his inheritance. But that was a matter of little moment to him then. Had he not a lodge and family, good horses and a vast domain actually teeming with game wherein to wander—what more could one possible want?

Leaving the Hudson's Bay company \*\*, Monroe sometimes worked for the American Fur Company, but mostly as a "free Trapper" wandered from the Saskatchewan to the Yellowstone and from the Rockies to Lake Winnipeg. The headwaters of the South Saskatchewan were one of his favourite hunting grounds. Thither in the early '50s he guided the noted Jesuit Father De Smet, and at the foot of the beautiful lakes lying just south of Chief Mountain they erected a huge wooden cross, and name the two bodies of water St. Mary's Lakes.

Hugh Monroe saw more "new country" and had more adventures than most of the early men of the West. During the last years of his long life, he lived much with his grandson, William Jackson, ex-Custer scout, who was my partner, and he loved to have him with us. Slender of figure, and not tall, blue-eyed and once brownhaired, he must have been in his time a man of fine appearance. Honest he was and truthful. Kind of hear and brave. A good Christian, too, and yet with no small faith in the gods of his Blackfoot people. And he was a man of tremendous vitality. Up to the very last he went about with his loved flintlock gun, trapping beavers and shooting an occasional deer.

He died in his 98th year, and we buried him in the Two Medicine Valley, under the shadow of the cliffs over which he had so many times helped the Pi-kun-i stampede herds of buffalo to their death, and in sight of that great, sky-piercing height of red rock on the north side to the Two Medicine Lake, which we named Rising Wolf Mountain. It is a fitting monument to the man who was the first of his race to see it and the great expanse it overlooks.

\*\*He left a year or so after the coalition of the Hudson's Bay and North-West Companies in 1821, but was listed in 1832 as an interpreter at Bow Fort (footnote in P.S. Ogden's Snake Country Jour-nals, 1824-25 & 1825-26, ed. Rich & Johnson for Hudson's Bay Record Society, p. 64). Mountain Fort was later called Bow Fort, on Blackfeet Bow River, main tributary of Saskatchewan River. (Rising Wolf, Nelson's edn., p. 12)

James Willard Schultz (1859-1947) wrote Rising Wolf, The White Blackfoot: Hugh Monroe's Story of his first Year on the Plains, and Red Crow's Brother: Hugh Monroe's' Story of his Second Year on the Plains, both published by Houghton Mifflin Co., Boston & New York, 1919 & 1927.

In 1951 Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer released part of this story adapted as a color Western "Across the Wide Missouri", starring Clark Gable with John Hodiak (d. 1955) as Hugh Monroe —"Hollywood as usual hammed it up and Hugh led his Indians dressed in a kilt." Dr. William M. O'Brien, Assistant Professor of Epidemiology and Internal Medicine at Yale University who pieced together Hugh's story from histories give to him from some of his descendants who are now members of the Blackfoot tribe, noted that he apparently had sever rheumatoid arthritis (see photograph) as had several of his descendant.

Dr. O'Brien, who first referred us to the books quoted, has published scientific studies of the Blackfeet in the American Journal of Public Health and elsewhere. "Is severe arthritis unduly common in Monroes in Scotland?" he asks. Editor.



We are delighted that on Saturday, April 5, Dr. Lynn McDonald will be receiving the Scottish Studies Society's 2025 Scot of the Year Award in view of her long public career and many contributions to building a better Canada, especially in relation to women's equality and pay equity. Dr. McDonald has been in the news recently for her work in correcting misunderstandings about key historical figures such as Sir John A Macdonald, Egerton Ryerson and Henry Dundas by placing them in historical context.

Dr. McDonald has made enduring contributions as a scholar and social activist. She is professor emerita of sociology at the University of Guelph and has written extensively on the impact of women thinkers in the 18th and 19th centuries. She also served as a Member of Parliament when her Non-Smokers' Health Act of 1988 led the world in enacting legislation to establish smoke-free work and public spaces. In addition, in a labour of love, she published the definitive collection of Florence Nightingale's writings, bringing renewed attention to this important female icon for a new generation. She was named a Member of the Order of Canada in 2015 and elected a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society in 2019. In 2020, she joined with Ryerson academics and supporters to form the Friends of Egerton Ryerson, whose goal is the restoration of Ryerson's reputation and refutation of the false accusations against him. In 2023, she was appointed to the Advisory Board of the Canadian Institute for Historical Education and has been instrumental in correcting information about Canadian events and individuals.



# Tarbat Discovery Centre - Book of Kells Event



### Was the Book of Kells created by the Picts?

Dr Victoria Thompson Whitworth investigates the origins of the Book of Kells in this upcoming free event.

Was it perhaps made in Portmahomack?

The Book of Kells, perhaps the most important surviving manuscript of medieval Europe, on display at Trinity College in Dublin, contains the four gospels of the New Testament. Traditionally thought to have been written around 800 CE on the Scottish island of Iona, scholars are now rethinking the manuscript's origin – and some

are suggesting that it might have been made by the Picts in Scotland's Northern Highlands.

Renowned early-medieval scholar Dr Victoria Thompson Whitworth will present her latest research into the links between the small Scottish Highlands village of Portmahomack and the Book of Kells, in an event hosted by the Tarbat Discovery Centre on **Thursday 30 January 2025 at 7.00pm**. Dr Thompson Whitworth will be joined at the end by Master Craftsman Thomas Keyes, an expert in reproducing the techniques of medieval manuscript production. The event will take place live in Edinburgh's Augustine United Church and be live-streamed online.

An increasing number of academics and museum professionals are questioning the accepted narrative of Iona as the place of origin for the Book of Kells. Now, a medieval monastery on Scotland's Tarbat peninsula is gaining attention as a possible alternative. Dr Thompson Whitworth will contribute to the discussion by exploring questions such as 'Is the Book of Kells a Pictish manuscript?', 'Could it have been written in Portmahomack?', and 'Are materials used in the Book of Kells from the Tarbat Peninsula?'.

In the 8th century, a large monastery was located at the site of St Colman's Church in Portmahomack, a village north of Inverness in the Scottish Highlands. Archaeological digs show that the monastery's monks had the tools, techniques, and skills to make manuscripts — and Dr Thompson Whitworth argues that the Book of Kells might well have been one of the texts produced there. At the upcoming event, she will explore the origins of the Book of Kells and its connections to Portmahomack and the Pictish world. The Picts lived in Scotland around 300-900 CE and left remarkable carved standing stones as their main legacy with no documents that have yet definitively been identified as Pictish - but did they perhaps leave behind the manuscript now named the Book of Kells?

The monastery at Tarbat was rediscovered by the University of York's ten-year research programme, the Tarbat Discovery Programme, in partnership with the Tarbat Historic Trust. Led by Prof. Martin Carver, this project resulted in the book Portmahomack: Monastery of the Picts (Edinburgh University Press) that describes the discoveries, and the full report, Portmahomack on Tarbat Ness: changing ideologies in North-East

Scotland sixth to sixteenth centuries, which can be found at <a href="https://books.socantscot.org/digital-books/catalog/book/4">https://books.socantscot.org/digital-books/catalog/book/4</a>.

The lecture is part of the Discovery Centre's Stories on Skins project, supported by The National Lottery Heritage Fund. The project is led by Master Craftsman Thomas Keyes, who created four elaborate manuscript pages, currently on display at Portmahomack's Discovery Centre. Using the same materials and techniques that monks used in the 7th-8th century monastery at Tarbat, the artworks are inspired by the Book of Kells, and each depicts Celtic legends or myths.

Thomas Keyes will join Dr Thompson Whitworth at the event for a conversation on their individual research and artistic practices that have contributed to better understanding medieval manuscript making, and have produced new evidence regarding the origins of the Book of Kells.

Ellen Marks, Trustee of the Tarbat Historic Trust and designated trustee for the Stories on Skins project, said "What an exciting opportunity, bringing together two noted authorities to share their expertise and enrich our understanding of the debate regarding the origin of the Book of Kells—and the place of eastern Scotland in that history".



The event follows the time-honoured format with the Address to a Haggis, the Immortal Memory and Toasts to the Lassies and Laddies. With the Society's upcoming annual celebration of the Bard on Friday, January 24th, what better time to introduce new resources highlighting Robbie Burns and his enduring impact as the national poet of Scotland and a Scottish cultural icon.
